A Condensed History of The Calumet Education Foundation

(taken from the writings of Raymond Fecteau & Maurice Violette)

Since its founding in 1922, Le Club Calumet's aim has been to promote the "development of Franco-Americans". Over the years, the "club" has supported this aim by advising students to pursue higher education. Beginning in 1927, Le Club Calumet appointed a committee to encourage students to continue their education by enrolling at Cony High School.

Later, in 1947, Albert J. Lemieux suggested the club set up a scholarship fund for students of Franco-American descent and in 1949 awarded the first four-year scholarship for Phil Coulombe to attend the University of Maine. In 1957, Irenee Pelletier proposed that all club members be assessed \$1.00 on the anniversary of their birth to be deposited into an education fund to help students pursue a post-high school education. The birthday dollar program continues to this day.

The accumulated funds served their purpose for many years until the demand outgrew the supply. In addition to an ever-depleting account, it was cumbersome to manage the education awards. A new program was developed to operate under government regulations, provide for a complete accounting of funds and expand financial aid across the community.

In 1965, a group headed by Maurice Violette, Paul Lambert, and J. Leo Lachance spearheaded the effort to organize this new program. Others who participated in this exciting venture were: Arthur Bouchard, Conrad Castonguay, Robert Lacasse, Normand Laflamme, Armand Beaulieu, Henry Breton, Alphonse Boucher, Richard Dumont, Leo Levesque, Armand Demers, Robert Levesque and Alfred Douin. On March 1, 1967, the Calumet Educational & Literary Foundation, Incorporated, was launched under the watchful eye of the State Attorney General Office, the Maine Corporation of Banking, and the Internal Revenue Service. The "Foundation" became a tax-exempt group with all funds raised to be used expressly for educational purposes.

Initially, the Foundation's assistance program was authorized to grant interest-free loans to students enrolled in vocational programs, technical colleges, and universities. This program was successful for many years. Eventually, even though Loretta Paradis managed to keep up with the students' status, payment schedules, etc., the time it required led to a new program. While casually shooting pool one day, Ray Fecteau and Ray Lausier had a novel idea, and they quickly enlisted the skills of Maurice Violette to develop it. Why loan the money they asked.... let's give it away! So, in 1988 the Foundation voted to convert the no-interest loan program to a grant program as it exists today.

When first incorporated, the Foundation administered two scholarships in addition to grants. Today there are 21 scholarships, and the Foundation awarded 26 grants. The Foundation proudly continues to live out the mission of its founders, to help area students pursue their goals of higher education.

President's Report 2024

The Calumet Education Foundation proudly continues its legacy of assisting area students pursue higher education. The Foundation awarded over \$4,000,000 in grants and scholarships to over 2,000 students.

The scholarships and grants administered by the Foundation have made a tangible difference in the lives of many of our area's graduating seniors and college students. In 2024, \$140,000 in scholarships was offered. Over \$50,000 in grants was awarded to upper class college students.

The Foundation would not be able to operate without the invaluable dedication of the trustees who volunteer their time. The trustees are committed to the mission of supporting students' pursuit of higher education. This year we thank and sadly say goodbye to Debbie Tondreau, who has been a trustee for many years serving as secretary. We wish her the very best in all her future endeavors. The Foundation also thanks Allison Conley for her service to the Foundation and wish her the best in her future endeavors.

We are deeply grateful to those who have entrusted us to administer their scholarships in accordance with their wishes. We also thank all who have made generous contributions in the form of memorial donations, or outright gifts. It is benevolent giving that will allow the Foundation to continue in perpetuity.

Grants Report

The Grants committee met in November to review applications and issue awards based on an approved allocation of \$50,100.

We received 35 applications, and the grants were awarded as such: Four seniors each received \$2,400, thirteen juniors received \$1,500, and nine sophomores were awarded \$1,000. Four applications were denied on the following basis: One was a graduate student, and three others were recipients of Foundation scholarships in 2024.

Financial Statement Assessment

The Foundation's Finance Committee performed an annual assessment of the financial records for the year ended December 31, 2024.

This assessment is to determine whether the 2024 financial statements of the Foundation properly reflect all significant* transactions and allocations approved by the board. Our assessment involved performing procedures to obtain evidence about significant amounts in the financial statements. Procedures included vouching significant balances to supporting documentation, review of bank statements, and the testing of selected receipts and disbursements. We did not note any misstatements or improper transactions as a result of these procedures.
